#### MESSAGE FROM YOUR VICE PRESIDENT

## "Shipwrecked Lives"

As I was preparing for this Newsletter article, I was curious what the Scriptures shared about ships.

In my research, there were at least 31 references regarding ships and 41 references on sailing.

A few ships mentioned were war ships, (Numbers 24:24; Daniel 11:30); passenger ships, (Jonah 1:3; Acts 27:2); Solomon built a navy of ships, I Kings 9:26 possibly for trading; and fishing boats, (Mt 4:21, Luke 5:4-8 John 21:3-8).

However, the most famous ship in the Scriptures would be Noah's Ark. Basically a "cargo ship" caring @ 6,744 animals, and 8 "crew members," Noah and his wife, his three sons and their wives. (Genesis 6 -8). The Ark was @ 515 feet long; 86 wide and 51 feet tall in comparison to the "Super Sara" which was 1,063 feet long, 130 wide at the waterline and 25 stories high!

A big difference in both size and in purpose!

The apostle Paul uses both military and nautical metaphors when charging Timothy in his ministry profession in doctrinally and morally,

"Timothy, my son, I give you this instruction in keeping with the policies once made about you, so that by following them you may fight the good fight, holding on to faith and a good conscience. Some have rejected these and so have shipwrecked their faith. Among them are Hymenaeus and Alexander, whom I have handed over to Satan to be taught not to blaspheme." I Timothy 1:18-20(NIV)

If the church was to advance a fight against false teachings and moral sins, he had to fight the good fight with faith and a good conscience for a person to distinguish between right and wrong.

Paul uses a nautical term "shipwreck" to explain what can happen when someone does not fight the good fight and keep the faith and have a clear conscience. The idea of the "shipwrecked" faith of Hymenaeus and Alexander is that they had veered off course, away from good teaching, and drifted into the dangerous rocks of false teaching.

They had wrecked their faith. Paul clearly links faith with a good conscience. Interestingly, the word translated "rejected" in verse 19 is a nautical term meaning "thrown overboard." Hymenaeus and Alexander had tossed out the good conscience that comes with proper belief—in other words, they loved sin.

The "ship" of their faith went out of control and wrecked. So those who accept false teachings and ignore their conscience will suffer spiritual damage, like a ship that hits the rocks and is broken up.

Therefore, let Jesus be the "helms man" of your life to guide you through the "unchartered waters" of life to avoid "the rocks" which can shipwreck your life not only spiritually but can impact us physically and emotionally.


#### THE END OF THE BLACK STRIPE

A rare and fascinating view of USS Saratoga (CV-3) in the newly built Dry Dock #4 at Puget Sound Naval Shipyard on March 3, 1941.

You can see the yard workers in the process of painting out the famous black stripe that had been there since 1929 to distinguish her from her near identical sister, USS Lexington (CV-2).

From 6 January to 15 August 1941, Saratoga underwent a long-deferred modernization at the Bremerton Navy Yard that included the widening of her flight deck at her bow and the installation of additional antiaircraft guns and a CXAM-1 radar.

Each quarter the Treasurer sends a report to the Saratoga Executive Committee advising them of funds in the bank and the status of expenses.


Your Treasurer will continue to update the Executive Committee Quarterly and share as much information as possible with the general membership via the Newsletter. Your Association is doing very well.

The last reunion in Harrisburg was a success. We made money after all expenses. The Ship's Store made money at the Harrisburg reunion. However, the Ship's Store, the inventory, the lack of a Store Manager, including the general upkeep and yearly transportation costs, prompted the Executive Board to liquidate the store, and sell the inventory. A few small items, that did not sell, were donated to military or veterans' organizations. The Ship's Store trailer was sold. All proceeds were transferred to the General Fund. We still have three bank accounts – the General Fund, the Ship's Store, and the Scholarship Fund. Everyone will be given new information about the next edition of the Saratoga Ship's Store in the coming months. Your Executive Board members will be happy to answer any questions. Our new Ship's Store management organization will sell Saratoga related merchandise and channel proceeds to our Ship's Store Account. So, the Association will make money and have no store-operation expenses.

The Scholarship Fund account is very solvent thanks to your generous donations. Many shipmates have made donations that will keep our scholarships supporting students for many years to come. Thanks to everyone who has made donations, and will make future donations, to this very worthwhile cause.

In mid-2023, the Association decided to invest some of our funds in a Certificate of Deposit. Next July that CD will return around \$1500 that we can use to defer expenses or add to the Scholarship fund. A few words about our expenses. As I said earlier, after expenses, we have made money on the past two reunions. Currently, operating expenses are less are a low percentage of our revenue, which is fantastic. We will always have costs associated with general administration, printing and mailing of our publications, maintaining our Website, and storing and transporting our Memorabilia. Our revenue income keeps the Association well below the designated Internal Revenue financial threshold, allowing us to continue our 501(c)(3) non-profit, tax-exemption status.
